Perennial wildflowers to sow by seed

Not everyone is as heartless as I and able to rip out lovely small seedlings just because they've had the bad luck of sprouting in the wrong place. But if you are ruthless, insensitive, and not at all sentimental, sowing plants by seed might just be for you. The benefits of seeding perennial flowers are that it's inexpensive compared to buying container plants, and the seedlings come up when conditions are ideal for them (sometimes years after seeding), plus they tend to establish quickly without extra water. Sowing is a great way to add color and "naturalize" a garden after planting larger specimen plants from containers.

I've had great luck with the plants illustrated above and there are many others to consider. Clockwise from top left they are: Brittlebush, Desert zinnia, Desert senna, Dogweed, Parry penstemon, and Tufted evening primrose. Between the six of them, there is color year 'round. None of them is particularly attractive to herbivores, though rabbits have the annoying habit of mowing down Penstemon stalks just as the flowers are about to bloom!

I like to mix seeds into a bucket of sand to "dilute" them and cast the mix by hand onto roughly raked dirt or into gravel: rough surfaces hide seeds from some of the bird and insect predators that will happily eat them otherwise. Watering is optional, so I just wait for mother nature to take care of that aspect. When they do germinate, I transplant or remove ones that came up too close together or in bad spots.

Seed mixes are usually available at nurseries and nature-related retail stores, plus there are seed companies that can create custom blends. Below is a link for native seed specialists in the western US.
